# In with the new jail

CHARLES CITY — Floyd County voters on Tuesday approved a bond referendum to upgrade the courthouse and build a new jail and law enforcement center. The county can now borrow up to \$13.5 million for the project.

The unofficial results show the referendum passing by 68.72 percent. The county needed 60 percent.

The Floyd County Sheriff's Department posted this message on its Facebook page after learning of the election victory:

According to the county website, the project will include construction of a single story law enforcement center that includes the sheriff's office, a 32-bed jail facility, communications

(dispatch) center, and a secure elevator separating inmates from the public for access to the third and fourth floor courtrooms. A lobby will connect the new center with the existing courthouse. A multi-purpose room serving as an emergency operating center, training room and meeting room is available from the lobby for public access.

Improvements are also planned for the 1941 courthouse, including a replacement of windows to the original look of the courthouse, a new heating and cooling system and a reconfiguration of space needs for certain offices.

# City waiting for right time to raze bridge

CHARLES CITY — As the city waits for the right conditions to tear down the crumbling Charley Western Bridge, it's hunting for more money to build its replacement.

The exact date for demolition is still unsettled, but will most likely be in July, said Charles City Administrator Steven T. Diers. The Cedar River's level will be a key determining factor. The water needs to be as low as possible.

In the meantime, the city is considering contracts for grant writing and administration with the North Iowa Area Council of Governments. The council approved the contracts Tuesday, April 24.

According to Diers, the project has already been awarded \$249,000 through the Iowa Department of Transportation's

Transportation Alternatives Program. The Floyd County Snowmobile Association has been awarded \$35,000 to donate toward the project as well.

Through contracts, NIACOG will seek:

- a state Resource Enhancement and Protection (REAP) Grant. The maximum award is \$100,000.
- a state recreational trail program grant. The maximum is

\$400,000 with a 25 percent local match required.

• a federal Recreational Trail program grant. The maximum is \$400,000 with a 20 percent local match required.

The most the city would need to pay NIACOG for this service would be \$10,000, but that would be only if the maximum \$900,000, cumulatively, is awarded.

Water clarity is off-color, but should improve with fewer inputs. Water temperatures range from mid 50's to low 60's. Water levels are up, but stable.

Walleye - Fair: A variety of lures and baits are working; many anglers are using worms

Channel Catfish - Good: Catch catfish in the impoundments with dead chubs fished on bottom.

Smallmouth Bass - Fair: Nice sized smallies are finding their way to the creel. A variety of tackle is working; use a slow retrieve as the water is cold.
